LOOK AGAIN!

WHAT DID YOU MISS?

"Are you waiting for the book that says: 'Shadrack Jones is the son of Meshach Jones?' Do you search for a deed that proves the relationship between Abel Brown and Cain Brown?

Guess what? You may already have examined that book. You may already have found -and copied- that deed. You may find more success in solving your genealogical problems if you periodically take time to reexamine your research, rather than constantly seeking new sources."

Basic Methodology: as you look again through your research files, there are three major categories of what you might have missed: -something written on a document -something implicit from a document -something not in the file, but should be

10 reasons you may have missed it:

- your research was a long time ago and now you have additional info

- you were not as knowledgeable then

- you did not analyze what was missing

- you did not look at the <u>arrangement</u> of the source material

- you failed to take the time to read the introduction, the notes, the bibliography

- you quit after the abstract
- you failed to read every word
- the documents were difficult to read
- the documents were not accessible

- you did not analyze the document creatively.

<u>A YEAR IN THE SOUTH</u> <u>Four Lives in 1865</u> by **Stephen V. Ash**

"A Year in the South is about four ordinary people in an extraordinary time. They lived in the South during 1865 - a year that saw war, disunion, and slavery give way to peace, reconstruction, and emancipation.

- **CORNELIA McDONALD** battled poverty and despair as she struggled to raise seven children by herself;

 LOUIS HUGHES was a slave determined to gain freedom for himself and his family;

- **SAMUEL AGNEW**, a minister and son of a planter, grappled with spiritual and worldly troubles;

JOHN ROBERTSON, a former
Confederate soldier, searched for a new
life far away from war."

Geographical locations of the four families are Alabama, Mississippi and Tennessee. Extensive Notes by chapter; Bibliographic sources include Manuscripts, Newspapers, and Published Sources; plus an Index.

Ash wrote a social history that included the deep sense of prejudice and old habits amongst the common folk - male and female, churched and unchurched in three of the eleven states south of the Mason/Dixon line in 1865.

It was a good read and the stories may help explain some viewpoints, or it may help fill in some blank spaces in our family histories. Editor
