Alsace Websites

So do you suppose that those German ancestors of yours might have come from France instead of Germany? Specifically, from Alsace (Elsass in German) tucked up in the northeast corner of France. It is just across the Rhine River from Germany, bordering that country on both the east and the north. Through the centuries, control of Alsace bounced back and forth. For years it would belong to France, then Germany and then back again, depending on who won the last war. To this day, German surnames are very common there.

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"The Imperial territory of Alsace-Lorraine (German: Reichsland Elsass-Lothringen) ... was a territory created by the German Empire in 1871 after it annexed most of Alsace and the Moselle region of Lorraine following its victory in the France-Prussian War. The Alsatian part lay in the Rhine Valley on the west bank of the Rhine River and east of the Vosges Mountains. The Lorraine section was in the upper Moselle Valley to the north of the Vosges Mountains. In relation to its special legal status, since its reversion to France following World War I, the territory has been referred to administratively as Alsace-Moselle.

"Upper Alsace (Oberelsaf3), capital \sim Colmar corresponds exactly to the current department of Haut-Rhin.

"Lower Alsace (Unterelsaf3), capital ~ Strasbourg corresponds exactly to the current department of Bas- Rhin.


"Lorraine (Lothringen), capital ~ Metz, corresponds exactly to the current department of Moselle." (1)

Emigration from Alsace to the United States was especially heavy during the 19th century, with many of those Alsatians settling in America's midwest. The size of Alsace-Lorraine is less than 150 miles from north to south.

France is composed of one-hundred (100) departments, with two of them making up the area known as Alsace - #67 Bas-Rhin (Unterelsass in German) in the north and #68 Haut-Rhin (or Oberelsass) making up the south half. <u>2010 was a</u> landmark year for descendants of those immigrants from Alsace, as both Bas-Rhin and Haut-Rhin put their old church and civil records online. Both sites are in French, but, with persistence, a spirit of adventure and a genealogical word list, they can be navigated by those of us who do not know the language.

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French records have a unique feature, the Tables decenalles , ten-year indexes of births, marriages and deaths. The writing is usually readable, which isn't always the case with the original records. These indexes give dates for those events, making it much easier to locate the records themselves. The ten-year indexes do not cover all the record years.



To find records for Haut-Rhin, go to: <<u>http://</u> www.archives.cg68.fr.Services Actes Civils.aspx.> Šelect your village (commune) click your choice under "Type d'acte": Tables decenalles, Naissances (births), Mariages (marriages) or Deces (deaths). Click on "Rechercher", choose the years and click on "Visualiser". To go back to the home page, click on "Retour"

For Bas-Rhin, go to: <<u>http://etat-civil.bas-rhin.fr.adeloch/index.php></u> First you agree to accept their conditions, then click on "Application flash". Select the first letter of your village name, choose yours from the list. On the next screen, slide the bar along the bottom edge to the years you need, double click on the record you want. As with the records for Haut-Rhin, hold down on your left mouse button and you can move the record around the screen. Click on the screen to enlarge the image.

History of East Immanuel Lutheran Church

Norwegian settlers from Black Brook and Alden townships originally chartered this congregation in 1870 having come up the Mississippi and St. Croix rivers by flat boats. A Frenchmen, **Charles Vassau**, provided transportation from the river landing near **Stillwater, Minnesota** to **Wagon Landing** in **Alden** township, **Wisconsin**. Here the pioneers found the Babcock General Store, Post Office and Notary Public to serve their needs as newly arriving immigrants. The charter members of this congregation were: **Nils Otterson, Jakob Hougdahl, Ole Monserud,**

Hans P. Kulpen, Jonas Christianson,

Lauritz S. Selvig, Edward Larson, Ole O. Sundlie, Peder Pederson, Hans Larson, Bryngel O. Solum, Johannes Johnson, Ivor O. Aas, Andreas Larson, Peder J. Gaudt, Anders P. Bjorholdt, Sijvert Evenson, Peder Jakobson, Lars Bottolfson, John Amundson, Even Sather, Torsten Halvorson, Jens Syvertson, Peder Sather, Hans N. Putten, Torger Halvorson, Andreas Fredrickson, Augustian Hanson, Peder Ingebriktson, Torsten Olson, Ivar Michaelson, Peder Frohre, Emil Olson and Simon Hanson.

The same year, congregants built a log church on a portion of land owned by **Peder Pederson** and became generally known by its location, "Blackbrook Church".

The first recorded business meeting on 1 March 1875 at the

home of **Halvor Halvorson** dealt with establishing a cemetery. In the early years the members were assessed as the need arose. An example in one year, the assessment was \$.50 for the pastor's salary and \$.75 for a board fence

around the church yard.

During 1872-1877 a bitter strife within the Norwegian Synod regarding doctrine divided families and neighbors. Some of the congregation withdrew from the Norwegian Synod and joined the newly formed Norwegian Danish Evangelical Conference and others withdrew to join with

the Little Falls Congregation.

The worst depression of the times in 1893-1897 saw this congregation with a need to borrow money at 12% interest, when butter sold for 12 cents a pound and eggs for 6 cents a dozen. About this time a motion was passed at the business meeting to forbid smoking and spitting tobacco juice in church. Apparently it was not entirely effective as the matter was brought up at a later meeting. Due to the continued strife in the Norwegian Synod, the East Immanuel congregation withdrew completely, operating as an independent congregation for a long time. By 1902, **East Immanuel, Little Falls** and **West**

Immanuel together called one Pastor to serve all three congregations until 1917 when **West Immanuel** separated to form its own parish and **Little Falls** joined with

Deronda to form a joint parish. For the first time, **East Immanuel** was a parish on its own.
