- 4. Always document your sources, no matter how much they contradict one Be consistent as you cite another. your sources, there are standard citation formats, but even if you just make up your own format for listing your sources, be consistent with whatever method you use.
- 5. **Most days are approximate.** It is okay to state that someone was born "abt 1845" or died "May 1915" if you are unsure of the exact date or where documents show different dates.
- 6. *If unsure, say so!*
- 7. Future researchers will thank you for being honest if you simply say that you cannot prove a specific fact, yet you 'suspect' such and such is true. not fudge the facts - EVER!

Harper School District No. 1 Eureka Township 1869-1914

Integrated with Eureka Center The first school of Eureka Center

was the Harper School. It was about a mile-anda-half south of what is



now Eureka Center. All the children as far as the St. Croix Town line went to Harper School. Some children having four to five miles to travel to school.

The first meeting held to form School District #1, was held at the home of **John C.** Beede on 29 August 1868. It was moved and carried to accept a gift of one acre from L.A. **Harper** for the new school. Also moved at this meeting that a female teacher be hired and that a 3 month term of school begin on the 1st Monday of December and two months the summer following.

Moses Keezer had the contract for building the new school, 18 x 24 feet with 6 windows of 10 x 24 inch glass, one outside door For the sum of \$95.00, Mr. to be hewed. Keezer was to frame and raise the school, enclose it, put a roof of one foot projecting with finish to it, lay the floor, planed and matched, 6 seat with backs and desks.

Continue: Harper School

From old Clerk's Ledger of the Minutes Records you will see the first school was built in 1869 and a second school built in 1873. A special meeting on 3 August 1872 decided to build a new school on the site of the old. The contract was given to Matthew **Young** for \$475.00 completion date 15 March, 1873.

Harper was one of three towns in the plat book in 1878 - Harper, Patterson and North Valley. All three towns had a post office and all were started before 1880.

When the railroad went through, Patterson was absorbed by the new town of Milltown, which was only a saw mill before this action. North Valley died and Harper was absorbed into Eureka Center.

The 30th day of November 1895 describes locating and establishing a schoolhouse site for District #1, awarding the owner of SE 1/4 of NW 1/4 of Section 30 compensation of \$10.00 for the land. (This school was located on what was known in 1975 as the Chester **Anderson** property). The school was eventually sold for \$143.00, the wood shed for \$12.00 and the stove for \$4.00.
