Senior Class History

She was also President of the Literary Club in 1930 and a member of the Scholastic Red Letter Club in 1931.

She also was a member of the Hawaiian Guitar Club in 1931. Humorous things always happen to her. Life makes her laugh. She had charge of the Humor Department of the Monitor in 1931. She took part in the Class play of 1931.

Another Brantwood student who has worked his way through school, is reliable and has made a success of all things he has entered, can be none other than Eino Hervi. His oratorical and persuasive powers will be an asset to him in any business he follows. A large percentage of the High School girls claim he has the best and most accommodating taxi service between Tripoli and Brantwood. Eino participated in extemporaneous speaking in 1930; Basketball team 1929-30; class play in 1930 and 1931; and was Business Manager of the Monitor in 1931.

We will miss her cheerful disposition and clever sense of humor next year as we almost did in 1931. She has a great imagination in writing. Belle was a member of the Home Economics Club in 1928. She took part in Declamatory work in 1928-1929-1930, winning first place in the last two years. She was a member of the basket ball team in 1930; Secretary and Treasurer of the class in 1929; and a member of the Glee Club in 1930. She took part in the class play in 1930 and was assistant Advertising Manager for the Monitor in 1931.

Upon first appearance Elsie Leino seems to be meek and quiet, but she can fool you, too, because her curiosity brings her courage, for "Oh, how she can argue!" She probably had a reason for entering Declamatory work in 1930, some motive like producing a clear speaking voice. Elsie took part in the Home Economics Club in 1928; gave her capable assistance to the basket ball team in 1930; was a member of the Hawaiian Guitar Club, Scholastic Red Letter Club member, Monitor Typist, and took part in the class play in the year of 1931.

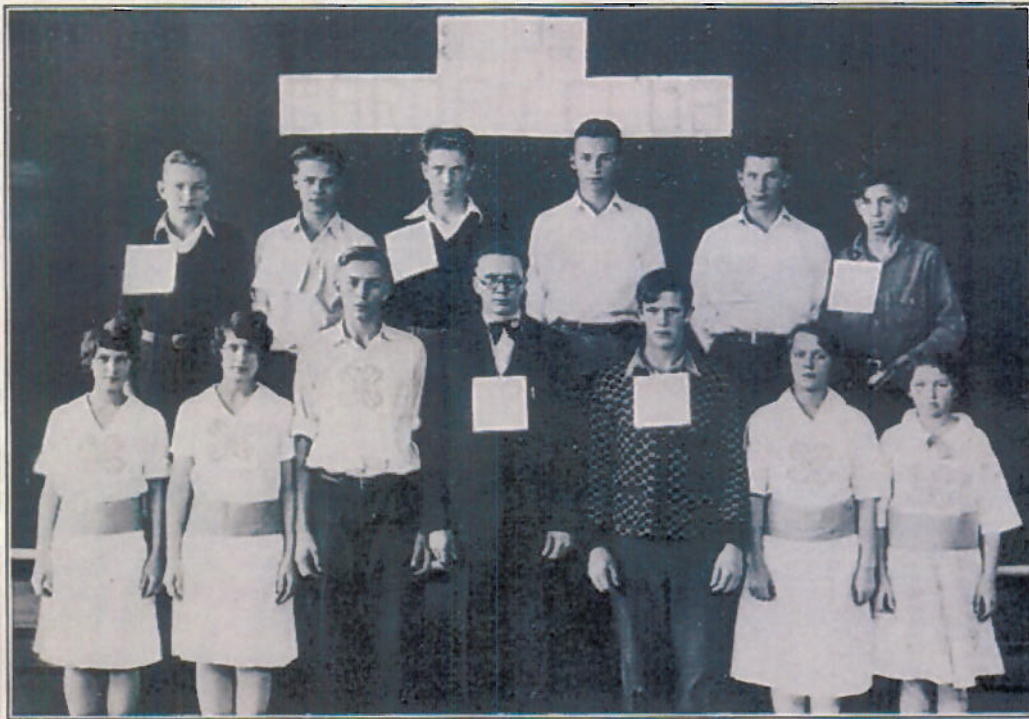
History
